Radcliffe comes 1st in the Milton Keynes Parliamentary Debate Competition

On the 12th December our Debate Team travelled to the Palace of Westminster to take part in the finals of the Milton Keynes Schools Parliamentary Debate Competition. Once again, Sixth Formers Anna Bulman and Emily Bartlett were speaking for the Radcliffe, having ousted Oak Grove, the Webber Independent School and Stantonbury in previous rounds.

In the final, they were up against very stiff competition from Shenley Brook End. The motion Anna and Emily were opposing was 'Representatives are under obligation to carry out the democratically expressed will of the people.' Each speaker had prepared a six-minute speech, and interventions were allowed inside the middle four minutes. **Anna** and **Emily** stood up to a barrage of challenging interventions from Shenley and managed to find time to make the points that they had been working hard to research in the previous week.

The competition took place in a chamber normally used for parliamentary backbenchers' debates; a very formal and historic venue adjoining Westminster Hall. Our students were impressed by the green leather chairs and array of individual desk microphones!

It was a hard-fought and very close competition, with each side gaining advantage and conceding ground at certain points. Ultimately, however, the Radcliffe School defeated Shenley Brook End to take home the title and prestigious shield, which will be kept in the school until we are called upon to defend the title next year. In the meantime, Anna and Emily will be establishing and running a Debate Group for Year 11 students, so watch this space.

I'm sure you will join me in congratulating our champion debaters, Anna Bulman and Emily Bartlett, as well as their dedicated team of supporters: Mattisse Boddy, Elle Quinn, Shamima Afzal, Aliyyah Jabeen, Alex Medina and Mohsin

West End United Church visit

When we arrived, Rev. Jenny Mills was welcoming and relaxed with her approach. She let us move the chairs so we didn't have to sit in a strict order which made us all feel more comfortable with being in a different environment to what we are used to. Jenny also spoke about how anyone can attend the Eucharist even if they aren't baptized and she also takes the bread and wine last to show equality between herself and others attending the service.

We had a chance to look around and noticed differences between other denominations of churches; these churches had a considerable amount of differences compared to the church of England. Firstly, there was no spire, there was no image of Jesus on the cross and the altar was open to everyone as the minister believed in equality throughout the church. There was no Jesus on the cross as it was a free church and they believe in the resurrection and ascension; however different denominations of Christians believe differently about Jesus' resurrection.

Reverend Jenny Mills is the second female minister in Wolverton after Constance Coltman. Constance was the first female to be accepted on the ministry course in Mansfield Collage Oxford and Jenny Mills was the last person to be accepted onto the course. Constance was also a pacifist suffragette meaning she fought for women's rights in a non-violent manner.



She was a minister in Wolverton from 1932-1940, and a woman who still attends the church. remembers when she had Constance as a minister. As she was the first women minister in the UK, the BBC's Songs of Praise is going to celebrate Constance's successes and commemorate her hard work. Rev. Jenny Mills and the lady who remembered Constance will appear as guests on the show soon.

By visiting the church, we gained a lot more knowledge about the history of female ministers and about how different a free church is to a church of England church.

We think that the church inviting young people to invite them in to learn more about the Christian churches is important. This is because in the media now-a-days, religion is portrayed as negative because of the situations which occur in today's society and to learn more about a religion makes people realise the news is fake and you shouldn't believe everything you hear.

We would also like to thank Rev. Jenny Mills for allowing us to come to her church and talking to us about her faith.

Students were given the opportunity to speed interview guests and ask questions about employment and business. They also worked on their handshake!

Year 12 product design students spent a morning with local employer Knorr-Bremse. Not only were they challenged to work through a number of difficult interview tasks but additionally they found out about the wide range of career and apprenticeship opportunities available.


