Dear Parent/Guardian,

Here in Milton Keynes all our Secondary Schools and Academies are supported by specialist officers who work in partnership with them. The responsibilities of these officers are wide-ranging, but our aim is to educate young people and keep them out of the Criminal Justice System.

Research about the types of crime reported from school premises during school time, and the way in which it is reported has shown inconsistency. Thames Valley Police has embraced HM Government's Safer Schools Policy. In practice the expectation is that minor incidents that occur **during the school day on school premises** are dealt with by the school in the first instance. In the event that the school believe that further action is necessary, the Schools Officer is the appropriate resource to review and deal.

Unfortunately we are finding that students are regularly contacting their parents about incidents without giving the school the opportunity to investigate before calling police. Although we understand parents' concerns, we ask that parents communicate with the school first. Schools will report serious matters to police directly, but in most cases these matters can be dealt with by the Schools Officers, and we ask for your assistance. You can make contact with the Schools Officers direct on the non-emergency number 101.

Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

#### **Careers Information Advice and Guidance**

Year 12's visited the UCAS fair at Bedfordshire university in order to meet with a huge number of universities and apprenticeship providers. Student feedback was very positive and has helped them start their research on which universities they may want to make their applications to next term.

### **World Challenge 2018**

A group of 10 6<sup>th</sup> formers went to South Africa and the Kingdom of eSwatini for 2 weeks. As a group we completed the floor of a new community centre (poured concrete by hand), mixed lots of cement using only spades and laid 3 rows of breeze blocks, 3 door frames and helped calculate where the windows would go in the next phase (well done Nathaniel). We also had the opportunity to play games/teach children who were at the Care Point and they were happy to teach us some of their very sassy songs which included the boys pretending to get married and a dance off between the girls. Many of the under 3's walk on their own over 6km a day to get a meal before they return home. The year 13 girls did a great job cooking a variety of things on a barrel BBQ.

When we left the NCP we went straight over the boarder to Kruger National Park and saw lots of animals (including 4 of the big 5). The boys cooked burgers, risotto and a cooked breakfast over the next few days. The night Safari was worth paying the extra £15 and we saw lions so close we could have touched them.

The last leg of our trip was back to the Kingdom of eSwatini and the Malolotja Nature Reserve to complete a zip wire and a trek of epic proportions. The management were so nice and kept the restaurant open so we could watch the England Game on the first night.



But for me it's been two very different experiences.



I spent 10 happy years serving the reading public of Wolverton.

Finding myself looking for work after having my children. What could be better than an opportunity at the Radcliffe school when they "wanted to appoint staff to assist the work of The Radcliffe school library service". A need to be familiar with a computer was needed but no other qualifications. Remember, in 1992 computers were few and far between and very different from the computers we all love today.



school library and to this day I like to think of the Library as a public library for the school. We never close! Over the years I have increased the book stock and moved the complete library 3 times. When first employed I was based in Orchard Hall, somewhere I remember with very fond memories.

Over the years I have worked with some fabulous people, some have remained lifelong friends and some are no longer with us but ever in our memory.

I've helped naughty, studious, exciting, difficult students and I will remember them too. I hope I've made a difference during my time, with my passion for reading and knowledge and as I tell the students, that random piece of information may be useful one day, even if it's in a pub quiz.

So I leave the school for the second time. The school is moving into a new chapter of it's biography and so am I. Who would have thought the Radcliffe school would have had such an impact on my life. I will remember it fondly as a huge part of my life.

I wish everyone well - past present, and future, both staff and students

And don't forget, keep reading it really does make a difference.
























#### **Get Involved – Volunteering**



We are delighted that our students have taken part in the Get Involved - Volunteering (GIV) programme this year.

GIV is a small charity which helps 11-14 year olds discover the fun and benefits of volunteering. GIV helped to train a group of 5 sixth form mentors who have supported 5 Year 8 students to get involved in structured volunteering.

The GIV programme has helped improve the skills, confidence and motivation of students – as well as delivering real benefits to the community.





Our students learned how to work as a team in a treasure hunt at Great Linford and at the Caldecotte project.



The teams then planted some flower pots donated to us by Bunnings – we worked together to do the planting and water them every day (even in the heatwave!) so that they could be sold to staff to fund our community projects.

Our main community project was at Wolverton Community Orchard where we worked with local volunteers to repaint the dragon which had been designed and made by Radcliffe students many years ago. It was great to rekindle our relationship with the Orchard and give something back to our local community.









And finally we worked with adults with learning difficulties who are the residents of the Camphill Community in Willen.

We worked in the kitchen and in craft workshops to build relationships and skills with the residents.

The programme finished with a celebration in the theatre at Camphill where we (and the other schools taking part) gave a presentation to parents, teachers, sponsors, local community representatives including the guest of honour, the Deputy Mayor of Milton Keynes about all of the

activities in the programme. The afternoon ended with a dance and drama production which students had been working on in school with a visiting dance and drama teacher.

Our sixth form mentors were fantastic role models and worked really well with our students, students from other schools and community volunteers. 




#### Another successful year for Allsorts Club


