This half term, fifteen Year 11 students were invited to participate in an English intervention at The Longrigg Experience Centre in the Lake District. Longrigg was a truly valuable experience; all students benefitted vastly through a variety of creative activities guided by a team of exceedingly experienced instructors and teachers. Individually, each teacher contributed in producing alternative perspectives within lessons, helping to facilitate the students' tremendous amount of progress throughout the week.

As a consequence of dedicated and precise planning, students were assigned tailored and distinctive independent and group tasks in order to develop essential life skills. It was pleasing to work in a collaborative manner alongside staff to complete daily activities such as: cooking meals, cleaning and food shopping for eighteen people (which included a slight oversight of purchasing 30 pints of milk for the week!).





An early rise at 7am — our hectic days were about to commence! Mornings were filled with breakfast and lunch preparation, teamed with essential English revision sessions. This was closely followed by a somewhat bumpy ride in the minibus to the location of the main activity of the day which consisted of: abseiling, caving, hiking, canoeing and even a visit to Dove Cottage to develop our knowledge of Wordsworth and understanding of his poetry. The exhaustion endured by all was certainly excused by the overwhelmingly picturesque views!

We can say with confidence that all students thoroughly enjoyed the residential trip, and would certainly recommend the experience to anyone who has the opportunity to go in the future.






ZOØNIVERSE

REAL SCIENCE ONLINE

Can you see the wildebeest in this picture?



If you can, then you can participate in real online science.

Zooniverse claim to be the largest online platform for collaborative volunteer research and it provides opportunities for anyone around the world to contribute to real discoveries in fields ranging from astronomy to zoology.

"The major challenge of 21st century research is dealing with the flood of information we can now collect about the world around us. Computers can help, but in many fields the human ability for pattern recognition—and our ability to be surprised—makes us superior" www.zooniverse.org.

Your help will contribute to actual research, carried out by real scientists from the comfort of your own home, a really useful computer "game". Simply register an interest, complete a few practice tasks and then you will be part of the active science community.

Current projects include; Penguin Watch (spy on penguins in remote regions to help scientists understand their lives and environment); Snapshots at sea (help scientists identify marine mammals); Planet Four (explore Mars and help discover what the weather is like); Milky Way Project (find stars in the Milky way from the infrared image data from the Spitzer space telescope); Bat Detective (help characterise bat calls recorded by citizen scientists); Fossil Finder (search and discover fossils at Lake Turkana, Kenya).

Your time will help these projects move forward so why not give it a go. Your input will be included in these active research projects.

Modern Foreign Languages

Vocab Express Global Competition *3rd in the World!*



The Vocab Express Global Challenge took place from the $6^{th}-12^{th}$ March, with dozens of schools from all over the world taking part. In the last competition, Radcliffe School came 16^{th} , and our aim was to beat this. And we did – in some style!

In the Challenge Cup, which includes the contributions of all students, we gained a massive **873,815** points, which put us in **3rd place**!

In the Genius Cup, which includes the points from our top 25 scorers, we gained **668,415** points, putting the school in **2**nd **place**!

As if these achievements weren't amazing enough, we also had 6 students who gained places on the overall Student Leaderboard: **Darcie Stimpson** (8th), **Laiba** (9th), **Katie Thompson** (13th), **Rachel Thompson** (15th), **Cora Ainsworth** (29th) and **Annelise Collier** (33rd) deserve massive congratulations for all their efforts.

We topped the leaderboard for German with a score of 368,185, nearly 90,000 more points than the school in 2nd place, and placed in the top 20 for the following languages: French, Italian, Latin, Japanese, Russian, Polish, Mandarin, Hebrew, Portugues, Arabic, Urdu and Greek.

This is a truly fantastic achievement and we are so proud of all the students who took part.


Music Technology


IAG News

Malcolm Poulter

The school are saddened to announce the passing of Malcolm Poulter a committed member of the governing body at The Radcliffe. Malcolm had been working with The Radcliffe School for several years before taking on the role of governor in 2013. Through his role with The Rotary, he mentored sixth form students in business studies and was also a mentor on the annual Cranfield University Business Challenge, supporting one of the teams from The Radcliffe School. He started a successful Rotary Interact Club for students.

Malcolm joined the governing body in September 2013 and has been a loyal and trusted friend and strong advocate for the school. He was vice chair of the Personal Development, Behaviour and Welfare Committee and always showed his dedication to the welfare of students at the school. Schools rely on volunteers, often working quietly behind the scenes and ready to commit their time and energies in supporting staff and students; Malcolm exemplified the community-focused volunteer. He had a great belief in The Radcliffe School and what its students could achieve.

Our governing body always seeks to recruit governors who bring something special to the school. Malcolm had many years' experience in engineering, first as an apprentice toolmaker specialising in the aircraft industry. In the late 60's he moved into computer engineering, progressing into management and in the 80's moved into sales, selling. He later became a freelance account manager.

On a personal note I will greatly miss Malcolm's loyalty; I knew that we could always rely on him to give up his time and he was always the first to volunteer to take on additional roles within the governing body. I will miss his gentle humour and the chats we used to have after the meetings and I will miss his quietly attentive presence at meetings. On many occasions he would suddenly make an incisive contribution having listened to presentations from everyone else. The school has lost a friend and the governing body has lost one of its most dedicated members.
